


MCTX Community Connector Bus Wrap Branding Update



Project Overview

- ❖ At the April 16 Regular Meeting, Council unanimously authorized the resolution that approved the METRO Community Connector
- ❖ This on-demand service will allow individuals to travel anywhere within a zone, seven days a week for \$1.25; discounts will be available for students/seniors
- ❖ The bus is a 12-passenger ARBOC bus and is able to fit two wheelchairs
- ❖ The new service will connect residents to jobs, grocery stores, hotels, restaurants, the new HCC Missouri City Campus and METRO's local bus network
- ❖ The service is proposed to launch on Monday, Aug. 27 in time for the fall classes at the HCC Campus





Service Area

- ❖ METRO's Community Connector will travel within the specified zone and make stops at the proposed areas when it launches
- ❖ The transit zone is subject to change based on user feedback and the location of users



Branding

- ❖ City's & METRO's Communications teams have been collaborating for more than a month to ensure proper branding of this new initiative
- ❖ Due to the bus design some elements had to go through several iterations to showcase the customization of this service for Missouri City and our values
- ❖ The green base color was chosen in alignment with the City logo colors
- ❖ The images represent our Scenic City and our status as one of the BEST places to live, work and play
- ❖ The white City logo was used as it is most prominent on the green background and to ensure that this mobility partnership is prominent for all residents, visitors and stakeholders

SYNOPSIS

In alignment with the City's commitment to proactive community partnerships, City staff is providing Council with an update of our annual Leadership NOW Symposium, a one-day training and development session on October 4 and 5, 2018. We are proud to host the 2nd Annual **Leadership NOW Symposium 2018** in partnership with the cities of Pearland, Sugar Land, Houston, and Bellaire, TCMA, the University of Houston, Metro, NFBPA, and Texas Southern University.

Annually, the City of Missouri City and its partners through **Leadership NOW** welcomes approximately 400 public servants from across the state to add to their professional development toolkit. The purpose of this update is to share with Council highlights of this year's event.

STRATEGIC PLAN 2019 GOALS ADDRESSED

- Create a great place to live
- Grow business investments in Missouri City

BACKGROUND

For the 2nd year, the City of Missouri City and its community and governmental partners will host professional development sessions at the Quail Valley City Centre. This year's initial sessions are scheduled for Thursday, October 4, 2018 at the Quail Valley City Centre in Missouri City, Texas and later on Friday, October 5, 2018 at the Missouri City Community Center. The theme for the Thursday's events is "**Navigating Governance for Today and Tomorrow.**" We have confirmed several subject matter experts, large city mayors, city/county managers, and the Executive Director for ICMA to participate on panels and sessions that will assist with the growth and development of public administrators in the region. There is no better place to connect with leading city officials and public service professionals as they prepare to build a brighter future for our communities.

The City also plans to host Public Administration Day, which invites Missouri high school juniors and seniors to City Hall in order to be exposed to careers in public administration. Engaging youth in local career opportunities offers a number of benefits to the community and to young people themselves. These benefits include:

- **Exposure to careers in local government.** Through their engagement, young people learn about local planning and related professions and positions, and may consider careers local government.
- **Improved plans.** The participation of young people provides local officials with perspectives and input that can improve plans, especially (but not only) with regard to the needs and issues most relevant to youth.

- **Better use of youth-serving resources.** Better information about the needs and interests of young residents helps local agencies make the best use of financial and staff resources directed to youth programs and services.
- **Leadership opportunities.** Participating in the planning process offers young people an opportunity to acquire new knowledge and skills, learn responsibility and accountability, and develop meaningful relationships with other youth and adults. It also gives youth the opportunity to identify and address issues or challenges that directly affect their lives.
- **Citizenship and service.** Involvement in local planning allows young people to better understand their local government and community, to address community issues, and to develop habits of participation and good citizenship.

Alarming, the so-called "window of hope" is getting smaller and smaller: surveys conducted in many countries with high HIV prevalence rates show that young boys and girls are already sexually active by age 15.

While young people see themselves very much as agents of change, they are the most disadvantaged in terms of access to resources, information and decision-making.

The TML Intergovernmental Risk Pool Board of Trustees is comprised of fifteen voting members, twelve of whom are elected by the Pool's membership to serve staggered, six-year terms. Every even-numbered year, the term of office for one-third of the elected trustees expires and an election is held to fill those designated places.

Section 6 of the Pool's Bylaws sets forth the following election procedure:

“. . . Ninety (90) days prior to the date of the expiration of the term of office of any Board of Trustee member, all Employer Members shall be informed in writing of their opportunity to submit the name of a qualified person for election to that designated place. If an Employer Member wishes to submit the name of a qualified person for election, the name shall be submitted and received by the Board Secretary no less than (50) days prior to the expiration of the term of the office being sought. . . .”

Section 4 of the Pool's Bylaws sets forth the following qualifications for board members:

“Each member of the Board must be either an employee or official of the governing body of an Employer Member of the Fund at the time the Board member is elected or appointed. . . .” (In this context, “the Fund” is synonymous with the Pool.)

Terms for Trustees in Places 11-14 will expire October 1, 2018. Place 15 is an appointed public member and is not elected. Places 11, 12, 13 and 14 are currently being held by the following individuals:
